London on 24th February 2009: The Institute of Masters of Wine is delighted to announce that Dr. Liz Thach is the winner of the 2009 Andre Crispin Commanderie de Bordeaux Scholarship. This scholarship is worth a substantial amount to the recipient for travel and study in Bordeaux.



Dr. Liz Thach, a fifth generation Californian, finished her Ph.D. at Texas A&M. Now she is a management and wine business professor at Sonoma State University in the Wine Business Center where she teaches in both the undergraduate and Wine MBA programs. Liz has 15 years of executive and management level experience at Fortune 500 companies and has done consulting and research projects for more than 30 different wineries. Liz has published over 90 articles and 4 wine books, including Wine – A Global Business and Wine Marketing & Sales. She lives on Sonoma Mountain where she tends a small hobby vineyard and makes homemade wine.

About the Institute of Masters of Wine

The Institute of Masters of Wine was established in London, England, in 1953, since when over 2000 candidates have sat its rigorous examination in the art and science of wine. In 1991, the examination was held on the same days in the UK, Australia and the USA, a pattern that continues today.

There are currently 277 members of the Institute, from 25 different countries. Although membership was opened up to non-UK members for the first time only in 1987, 85 members now come from outside the UK. The vast majority of the students are now non-British, and the Education programme is run annually in Napa Valley, California; Melbourne, Australia; Rust, Austria; and Bordeaux, France.

The Master of Wine qualification is achieved by passing three parts of the examination:

- Theory, comprising four three-hour question papers on viticulture, winemaking, the business of wine and contemporary issues
- Practical, comprising three 12-wine blind tastings of a range of international wines which are assessed for variety, origin, quality and style
- a 10,000 word Dissertation on a subject selected by the candidate, relevant to the international wine industry

Candidates come from all areas of the wine industry. The majority are active in a commercial capacity, as wholesalers, importers or retailers, from major multi-nationals to independent merchants. A growing number are involved directly with winemaking, while other occupations include journalism, public relations, the hospitality industry and wine education.

About the Commanderie de Bordeaux

The Commanderie de Bordeaux aux États-Unis d'Amérique was organized in 1957 by a small group of lovers of Bordeaux wines and became a New York corporation in 1959. Since, it has grown to include 28 chapters and some 1100 members located in different cities around the US. It is also affiliated with a worldwide network of some 63 Commanderies in 18 countries under the overall patronage of the Bordeaux-based Grand Conseil du Vin de Bordeaux (GCVB; e-mail: gcvbx@club-internet.fr). The members of these chapters get together periodically for dinners (called "parlements" from the French verb *parler*, to talk) and other events in order to enjoy, discuss, appreciate and learn more about the various wines of the Bordeaux region in their different vintages.
