### **Modifications to the Children's School**

Bob Williams presented a request from the Children's School for several minor alterations to the building. These projects would be funded by a Department of Education Repair and Renovation Grant. The project elements were as follows:

- 1) An arch façade over the front entrance.
- 2) A solarium type toddlers room attached to the south side of the existing building.
- 3) A Parents' Deck and canopy on the south side of the Infant Toddler Center.
- 4) A new picket fence on the south side of the existing building.
- 5) Painting the deck and canopy on the north side of the ITC.

The committee approved the project unanimously with the direction that the Children's School would work with Bruce Walker to assure compliance with University policy on building codes and aesthetic compatibility.

### **Site and Concept Approval of Research Housing at Osborn Preserve**

Deborah DuVall asked the committee to consider a project proposal from the School of Science and Technology, on behalf of the Fairfield Osborn Preserve, for funding by the National Science Foundation. The project would complete and equip the Osborn Education Center, demolish the old site manager residence, and install a new building of

approximately 800 square feet to accommodate visiting researchers. Nathan Rank from the Biology Department elaborated on the need and use of such a facility. Bruce Walker illustrated the location and environment of the intended site. The grant proposal was for \$195,743 for the next fiscal year.

The committee unanimously approved the site and concept of new research housing should the grant be approved.

### **Report from the Sub-Committee on Naming of a Free Speech Area**

Rand Link gave a report from the subcommittee on a naming proposal submitted by the SSU Associated Students. He reported that, in accordance with the University Naming Policy, a subcommittee consisting of members of the Campus Planning Committee, student representatives, faculty representatives and a staff representative had met and considered the proposal to name the area in the north-west corner of the Central Quadrangle, in front of the Student Union, the Mario Savio Free Speech Area. The subcommittee evaluated the proposal and determined that the proposal met the criteria of the naming policy, section II.B.2, of “a person who has achieved unique distinction in higher education and other significant areas of public service”. The sub-committee, therefore, recommended to the Campus Planning Committee at large, that the proposed area be named the Mario Savio Free Speech Area.

The committee approved unanimously.

### **Approval of the North Entry/Booth Design**

Bruce Walker presented a concept and design for a parking information booth and an entrance tower and sign to be installed at the north entrance off of the Rohnert Park Expressway. There would be a tower and curved wall matching the design at the campus southwest entrance, and a 10' x 10' information booth that would be staffed for general campus parking and information. Vice President Schlereth stated that the funding for this project would come from Parking Revenue funds associated with the North Property Parking Project.

The committee unanimously approved the concept and design.
